Directions from the North:

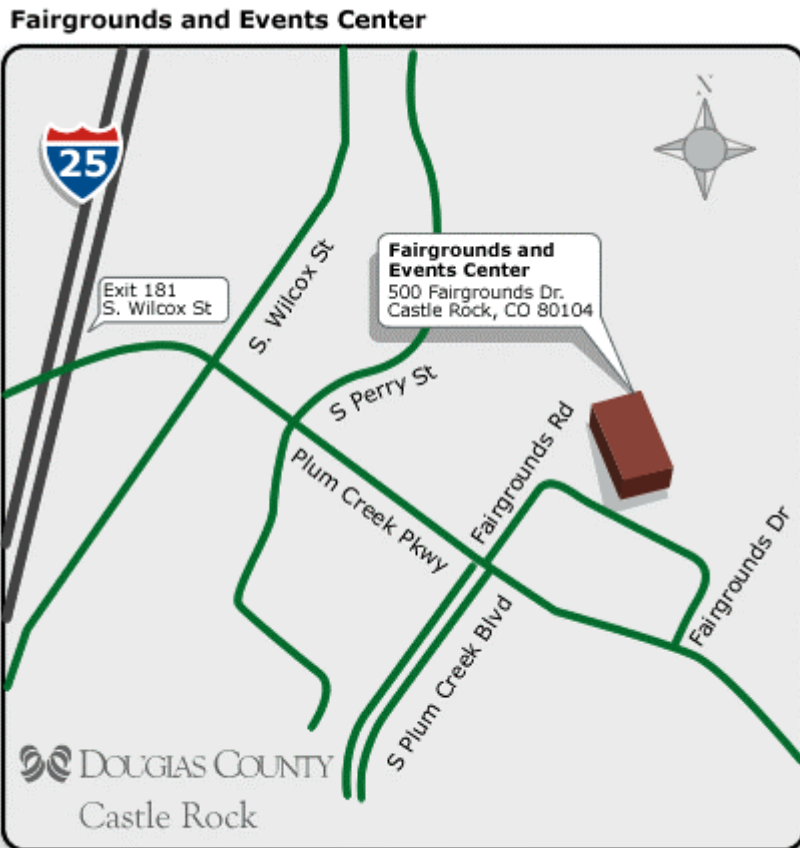

Partnership of local governments proves to be economical, efficient

True or false? It takes commitment and hard work on the part of many to progress from the talking to the action phase when something good happens for Castle Rock. The answer is true, of course. Increasingly, the involvement and commitment originate beyond town borders.

Enter the Partnership of Douglas County Governments. A consortium of taxing entities in the county, the partnership exists so that we (Castle Rock) or they (Parker or the Douglas County Libraries) don't have to go it alone.

Years ago, parochialism was the norm with cities, towns and counties demanding to be left to their own devices. Why? Jamie LaRue, director of Douglas County Libraries and that other pretty good News-Press columnist, has a theory he shared in an interview for the May edition of Castle Rock's television news magazine, Castle Rock View.

"I think what happened in Douglas County is everybody has grown so rapidly that, for a long time, everybody just had to pay attention to their own institutions and I think we've begun to reach this point of political institutional maturity where we recognize that none of us are in this alone."

Today, Castle Rock, Parker, Lone Tree, Larkspur, Douglas County and the county school and library districts are constantly looking for ways to save taxpayers money, leverage resources and improve service efficiency. They've been quite successful so far finding partnership opportunities and acting on them. A sampling of some successes, which are also illuminated on this month's Castle Rock View show:

- * Created the Douglas County Housing Partnership, which has leveraged local, state and federal grants to help hard-working Douglas County residents and fixed-income retirees find and keep affordable homes.
- * Created the Douglas County Youth Initiative which fills gaps in services for children and families and helps those who need them find the services.
- * Joint Parker-Town of Castle Rock sales tax collection.
- * Town of Castle Rock financial participation in the construction of a parking structure downtown, adding 79 public spaces.
- * County open space funding assistance and support for a state grant, enabling Castle Rock to purchase and preserve the open space mesa in Crystal Valley.
- * A countywide technology partnership to take advantage of pictometry - multi-dimensional geographic mapping and graphics tool.

- * A county-Douglas County School District partnership for a youth television academy.
- * County financial participation in construction of a new Larkspur Bridge.
- * A joint Lone Tree-Parker police dispatch center

The ideas for these and other partnership initiatives are generated in monthly meetings, in subcommittee sessions or in one-on-one conversations between elected officials or staff. In other words, we talk. Talking leads to mutual respect, trust and ultimately to action.

Some of the projects and initiatives the partnership is engaging are:

- * A leadership development initiative for elected officials and professional local government staff. We all have leadership training needs that we can't afford.
- * Regional facilities studies and planning. A regional performing arts center, aquatics center or ice skating rink anyone?
- * A "green" building initiative. Why not be at the forefront of "green" or earth-friendly building trends as we plan, design and construct needed facilities?

"Working together, we can bring all these to fruition. Separately it would be a much more expensive and much more difficult task to do so. Again, the partnership's goals are to work together and to bring, at a lower cost and savings to the taxpayers throughout the county, facilities and services that don't exist right now. "

I couldn't have said it better myself. Actually I did say it - in my Castle Rock View standup. Seriously, the Partnership of Douglas County Governments is working for all of us. I'm proud of what we've been able to accomplish together so far and I'm certain we'll continue to do more for less in the future.

RE: Green Summit

On May 24, 2007, the Douglas County Libraries sponsored a gathering of public officials, architects, public facility managers, and even some local manufacturers to discuss the idea of "Green Building." More generally, this means construction in a way that is designed to minimize the environmental impact of a building, and/or to reduce long term operating costs.

Our keynote speaker was Tom Hootman, Director of Sustainability and Senior Associate of the architectural firm RNL in Denver. He is also President of the US Green Building Council Colorado. Hootman is "LEED-accredited." LEED means Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design. It is a standard that quantifies costs of operation. Also speaking was Michael Lowell, Director, Property Development, GSA Advocacy Committee, USGBC Colorado.

Some highlights of the presentation:

- Green building has significant impact on the use of resources: 12% reduction in use of water, 40% of greenhouse emissions, 65% of waste output, and 70% of electricity consumption
- Green buildings see an average operational savings as follows: energy, 30%; carbon, 35%; water use, 30-50%; waste cost, 50-90%
- Green building directly addresses the bottom line: 30-70% energy savings, verified performance, enhanced productivity, reduced liability and improved risk management, increased value overall
- Green building results in improved test scores in schools (by 20%!), earlier discharge from hospitals, increased sales per square foot in retail, increased production in factories, and a 2-16% increased productivity in offices

- Green building turns a \$4 investment per square foot in construction into a \$58 benefit per square foot over 20 years.
- In Colorado, there are many LEED projects: 131 registered (15.5 million sf), and 28 certified (3.5 million sf)
- There are four (rising) levels of LEED certification: LEED, Certified, Silver, Gold, and Platinum.
- There are four current categories of LEED rating: new construction, commercial interiors, existing buildings, core & shell
- There are three new programs: homes, neighborhood development, and schools
- LEED certification costs are coming down: in California, a study found that 33 buildings over 10 years saw a construction premium of just 1.8% to build green; 5 had no cost increase at all
- On average, LEED certification pays for itself in 3 years; the annual return on investment is 25-40%!
- The premium varies by level: Platinum, 6.8%; Gold, 2.2%; Silver, 1.9%, Certified, .66%.
- Green building is sound fiscal policy
- Green building is sound environmental policy
- Green building is sound social policy
- Green building sets a positive example to citizens
- Green building sets a positive example to the private sector
- Green building attracts quality developers and businesses
- Cities that have embraced green building include: Chicago, Seattle, Austin, and Denver

Following this presentation was a roundtable presentation by Vicky Starkey (Facilities Manager for Douglas County), Richard McLain (Facilities Manager for Douglas County Libraries, and our only LEED certified manager), Lee Smit (Energy Manager for Douglas County School District), and Buddy Gregory (Facilities Manager for the Town of Castle Rock). Each summarized various projects they have undertaken, or intend to undertake. Among such projects are:

- energy savings (compact fluorescent light bulbs, lighting timers, solar panels)
- water conservation (water saving faucets, urinals and toilets, xeriscaping, synthetic turf)
- transportation (new fuels)
- green roofs – with actual turf

There was lively discussion with the audience. No LEED-certified projects have yet occurred in Douglas County. Some caution was expressed about the increased cost, and perhaps an unwillingness to commit to LEED-certification; like all large programs, just the documentation has a cost, not least in staff time. But the view of Hootman and Lowell is that without that discipline, the savings simply don't happen.



My own summary of the event consists of this: the numbers argue that green building has moved from fad to “best practice.” Partnership members have learned that although construction gets the public attention (because of the public bonding process), the real costs of our facilities are in operations. Clearly, some public education is necessary if we are to create a sustainable infrastructure. Moreover, a united decision by partnership members to *begin* with the intent to build LEED-certified facilities is intelligent public policy.

Graffiti in Douglas County

Talking Points

The Douglas County Sheriff's Office has seen an increase of Graffiti on county and private property in the past 6 months.

Most of the Graffiti / Tagging are associated with individuals not "Tagging Crews" or "Gangs".

The Graffiti / Tagging has been seen and documented on C470, in Highlands Ranch, and in Parker.

We have been able to determine that the individuals that have been tagging in the county are "Beginners".

Graffiti / Tagging on county & private property will continue as the county population grows.

The Sheriff's Office has joined forces with other local jurisdictions to form a Task Force, in which we share information on Law Enforcement Only web site.

What the Sheriff's Office and other cities & counties are finding out about these "Tagging Crews" & "Gangs" is that they are becoming very violent and all activity in the Metro Area needs to be monitored very closely.

Currently Douglas County does not have organized "Gang Activity", but a lot of "Want to be" kids.

Douglas County does not currently have any type of zoning ordinance to clean up Graffiti / Tagging on private property. Or any set time table to remove it from county or private property.

Graffiti in Douglas County

The facts from other cities & counties showed that all Graffiti / Tagging needs to be removed ASAP so that it does not encourage other to do the same.

Offer rewards for citizens who have information on the arrest and conviction of these criminal acts.

Put on the Sheriff's Office and county web sites, information on who to call to report Graffiti / Tagging.

Who does the property belong to and how to contact them.

In your booklet are ordinances from other cities & counties from the Metro Area and other states.

I. CALL TO ORDER & INTRODUCTIONS – RANDY REED

Chairman Reed Called the Meeting to Order at 7:30 A.M.

II. WELCOME & INTRODUCTIONS – Town of Castle Rock

Lehnen provided updates on several key projects in the Town of Castle Rock. The Town is moving forward with a planning initiative for the southwest quadrant of the

Town that could have significant regional impact. A design charette for the 4000 acres was held, and various economic studies and visioning surveys have been done. An open house on this project was scheduled for May 23, 2007 at the Castle Rock Recreation Center, and partnership members were invited to attend.

Lehnen stated the Town had awarded a contract for \$2.25 million for the first phase of the Southeast Arterial Connection project, including reconstruction of Ridge Road, construction of a roundabout at the intersection of Ridge Road and Enderud Blvd., major trail connections and other improvements. This phase of the project is scheduled to be completed this summer.

Lehnen noted the Town was launching a downtown parking enforcement program in response to merchant concerns about increasing turnover and boosting the local economy. This program also ties into the construction of the downtown parking garage in conjunction with the County expansion, and the promotion of the downtown as a walkable area.

Lastly, Lehnen reported the Town was gearing up for a revamped 4th of July celebration to include a wide variety of free community-wide, family oriented events at the Douglas County Fairgrounds, and culminating with a 40 minute firework show.

III. JURISDICTIONAL UPDATES

Boand, Douglas County – noted an application for incorporation from Franktown was expected to be presented within the next few weeks.

Reviewed possible County tax issues for the November 2007 ballot, including extension of the Road Sales Tax due to sunset, and also a potential public safety tax.

Noted Douglas County had joined the Rocky Mountain Rail Authority, and would be taking an active role in looking at options for commuter rail.

Noted construction on the Downtown Parking structure was under way. Several large trees had been removed to accommodate this project, but additional trees had been planted along Wilcox St.

Weston, Douglas Public Libraries – A survey providing an update on the Comprehensive Plan and seeking input on funding options for the Library District had been sent to a large number of community leaders, including all Partnership representatives. Encouraged everyone to fill it out and send it back!

LaRue – seven submittals for the architectural competition for the Arts Complex in Parker had been received.

LaRue reminded members of the Green Summit scheduled for May 24, 2007 at the Library. The keynote speaker would discuss trends in this area, and new concepts for

promoting environmentally friendly building, and then a panel of representatives from each entity would review how green building was being incorporated into current building practices and projects.

Turner, Douglas County School District – stated approximately 2,700 students would be graduating from the 7 high schools on May 24th and 25th.

Stutler introduced Steve Herzog, Chief Operating Officer, who would be representing the District on the PDCG after she retired in mid-summer. Also noted School Board had adopted a \$390 million general fund budget for the year beginning July 1, 2007. District added 180 teaching positions to address growth related needs.

Stutler noted CSAP scores had declined slightly at the 3rd grade level, and the District was working on a plan to address this issue.

Herzog provided an update on the status of the 8 schools the District currently had under construction, noting several had been delayed due to weather or other factors. Also noted two additional elementary schools were in the design phase, with bids going out in June. The proposed remodel of Douglas County High School would begin this summer as well, and was planned to be a multi-year project.

Krimmer, Larkspur – Town was going to re-establish the Planning Commission, and was hoping to pursue several economic development goals, including a potential senior housing project and planned to continue to review plans for a railroad underpass to improve access to Perry Park Rd.

Winters, Lone Tree – Administrative Offices had completed move to new facility and were planning an open house for late June. Plans for the Ridgeway Interchange had been finalized and approved by CDOT. Construction of the interchange was estimated to be a 20-month project, hopefully beginning sometime late this fall.

Winters noted recent surveys had indicated needs/desires for additional pools, trails and a performing arts center in Lone Tree. Noted Council would need to discuss how to finance all these items in the near term, and stated the potential for a tax increase was likely to be part of that discussion.

Jackson, Parker – Grand Opening for new Field House was scheduled for June 23, 2007. Site Study analysis/ need assessment for a new police station was underway. Major upcoming road projects included two bridges over Cherry Creek, as well as a complete reconstruction of Main St.

Castle Rock View Television Package on PDCG

A video showcasing highlights of the Partnership, its goals and its accomplishments, produced by Castle Rock View, which airs on Channels 8 and 22 was shown.

Producer Fritz Sprague expressed appreciation to all the members who participated in the interviews for this program.

Copies will be provided to all elected officials within the County.

Douglas County Housing Partnership Update

Executive Director Craig Maraschky provided an overview of the Housing Partnership and the major activities it has been involved with, including the Oakwood Senior Apartment acquisition, partnering in the Lincoln Point Lofts affordable housing project, the down payment assistance program, and homebuyer education programs. Reviewed financial data showing the price range for rentals and/or purchase amounts that was considered affordable, and how that compared to job trends /markets within the County.

Maraschky reported the DCHP won an award from the Colorado Chapter of NAHRO (National Association of Housing Redevelopment Officials, the trade group for public housing authorities) for best affordable housing project for the Oakwood acquisition.

Winters questioned if it was still the goal (as was stated in the original documents) of the DCHP to become self sufficient, thus reducing the request for funding to the entities.

Maraschky stated it was not likely that the DCHP would ever reach this goal, noting while there were grants for programs and projects, there were not funds available, other than from the members, to support the administration of these programs.

South Metro Water Supply Authority Presentation

Ray Waterman, Director, provided an overview of the Regional Water Master Plan the SMWSA was developing. The plan was expected to be presented to the Board for approval at the June 4, 2007 meeting.

Waterman reviewed key elements of the plan for increasing short-term renewable water opportunities and reducing reliance on ground water, as well as mid-term and long-term water strategies. Reviewed projects the SMWSA was involved with, particularly development of infrastructure, and plans for joint ventures to increase water supplies.

MONTHLY MANAGER'S UPDATE

Stevens reminded members of the Green Summit set for May 24th at the P.S. Miller Library from 2 to 4 P.M.

Stevens reported that no date had been set for the GIS Summit to be hosted by Douglas County. At this time GIS staff members from each entity were reviewing a

variety of issues and projects, and would report back to the Manager's group with recommendations for pursuing this issue.

Stevens reported a meeting of the Purchasing Agents from each entity was scheduled for next week.

Stevens reported all entities had appointed representatives to the Higher Education Task Force, and the first meeting of this group would be scheduled within the next few weeks.

Stevens reported a meeting on Senior Issues would be held on May 17th, coordinated by Marsha Meyer at the County, and representatives from each entity had been invited to attend. Noted the County had budgeted funds in 2007 to address senior issues, and there may be opportunities for other entities to collaborate and coordinate.

Stevens noted a regional facilities meeting was scheduled for today.

**TOWN OF LARKSPUR
RESOLUTION NO. 07-02**

**A RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING A PARTNERSHIP OF DOUGLAS COUNTY
GOVERNMENTS AMONG THE COUNTY OF
DOUGLAS COUNTY, AND THE TOWN OF LARKSPUR,
THE TOWN OF CASTLE ROCK, THE CITY OF LONE TREE,
THE TOWN OF PARKER, THE DOUGLAS COUNTY SCHOOL DISTRICT,
AND THE DOUGLAS COUNTY LIBRARIES.**

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the taxpayers and citizens of Douglas County to build relationships, foster communication and share information among local government entities; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the taxpayers and citizens of Douglas County for the Partnership of Douglas County Government (the "Partnership") entities to work together where possible on projects and programs where two or more of the entities have a common interest; and

WHEREAS, the Partnership was originally established in 2001, and it is appropriate to update the Partnership Resolution.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE PARTNERSHIP OF
DOUGLAS COUNTY GOVERNMENTS OF COLORADO, AS FOLLOWS:**

1. The Partnership commits to achieve the following: Cost savings to the taxpayers of Douglas County and its municipalities, improvements in operations, programming efficiency, and/or enhancement of the level of service currently being provided.
2. The Partnership is established to include the following members: The County of Douglas, the Towns of Larkspur, Castle Rock and Parker, the City of Lone Tree, the Douglas County School District, and the Douglas County Libraries.
3. Partnership members will delegate elected/appointed officials and staff to attend regular meetings of the Partnership.
4. The Partnership shall adopt operational guidelines, which may be amended from time to time by the Partnership.
5. The Partnership communicates its efforts and successes to its constituents to let the citizens of Douglas County and its municipalities know the importance and benefits of collaborative efforts.
6. Decisions by the Partnership are made by informed consent, meaning that no member present at the regular meeting voices an objection to a course of action by the Partnership.

7. New members will be recommended by the informed consent of the existing Partnership membership and ratified by resolution of all parties.


